The world knows that the first day of January is New Year's day. Almost every country declares a public holiday on that day. It is even customary for people to greet it with merry making in the streets and at home at the stroke of midnight.

The celebration of New Year is said to have started during ancient times, about 4, 000 years ago, in Babylon. The Babylonians celebrate it on 23rd March, instead of 1st January and were believed to celebrate it in a big way. It often lasted for eleven days. The Romans first celebrate it sometime in March until they fixed it on January 1.

In 600 B.C the Greeks used to parade a baby abasket to stress on the importance of the New Year. This tradition was carried out to honour the God of wine. Soon, many countries were using a baby symbol of rebirth to welcome the New Year.

The New Year celebration is associated with some form of superstitious belief. One such belief that whatever is done within the first few minutes of the break of the New Year would decide the course of events that are to take place in the next twelve months. Believing this, many people are careful to do the right thing during the first few minutes of the year. For example, they try not to break a mirror or walk under the ladder to avoid bad luck for the entire year. On the other hand, happy incidents on New Year would mean an entire good year.
